AUTUMN?!

You'd never know it by looking at the thermometer or trying to sleep at night without air conditioning (and seven dogs sleeping on the bed), but fall is just around the corner.

With autumn comes deer ticks, the ticks known to carry Lyme and other diseases. To keep our dogs safe from the tiny pests, many of us choose to use a flea & tick repellent such as Frontline.

We need to balance the risks of disease with the risk using chemicals bring to the dogs, us and the environment. It is a personal choice for each of us.

We generally use Frontline, but stretch out the applications from the recommendation to the end of the effectiveness window.

Recently, someone gave us a recipe for an all natural tick repellent. It was after the spring tick season, so we didn't get to test it on ticks. We have personally been testing it on deer flies with some success. Believe me, by us there were plenty of deer flies this summer! I have used it on myself and our pack. They seem to like it better than the citronella based Burt's Bees Insect Repellent we had used on them in the past.

We intend to try it for a tick repellent this fall. Keep in mind, nothing is going to keep ticks completely off your dogs, but this *may* reduce their numbers. We'll see.

If you would like to try an all natural repellent here is a recipe. The big thing about this solution is you have to like the smell of vinegar!

TICK REPELLENT RECIPE

Using a 15 oz. spray bottle, put in 3/4 full of water 1/4 full of apple cider vinegar 15 drops peppermint oil 15 drops eucalyptus oil

Spray on dogs or human and, if desired, dampen a bandana in it to put around the dog's neck for extra protection.

NEVER USE ESSENTIAL OILS ON OR AROUND CATS. This is for dogs or humans only.
